## **April Services**

April 6 – Rev. Andrea Abbott-Hook - Sometimes We're the Israelites, Sometimes We're the Egyptians. A recent intersection (literally) with a person from another country has me thinking about my own reactions to vulnerable people, immigrants in particular, given our current political horror, but also others.

**April 13 – Rev. David Weissbard – Sumbunall.** Most ministers have favorite sermons. I know I do. One of them is about the magic word "Sumbunall." This word is an antidote to much of what is wrong in the world today. Actually, Sumbunall was the subject of the second sermon I delivered at All Souls. I think it is time to consider it again.



**April 20 – Sarah O'Connell – Joy, and Bunnies, and the Easter Story.** The Soul Matters theme for April is Joy, so I'll be sharing my thoughts – and yours – for how this applies to this time of the year.

**April 27 - Robert South - The Utility of Joy.** Is joy the meaning of life, or is its value in service to something else? Is it perhaps win-win?

## From the President's Desk Robert South

This month I'd like to talk about money. The church's income comes from interest on the endowment (we cannot spend the principal), plus pledges from the members. The church spends more than the pledges could cover, and even the endowment doesn't make up the difference.

We've all received pledge cards. This year, there's an added space provided for donating extra for needed work on the building. The building always needs work and we always need money for it. Putting an extra block on the pledge card is our way of having a capital campaign without having a capital campaign (because we just had a capital campaign in 2017, and Reverend Guy said they are supposed to be once-in-a-generation things). I recall my parents taking us out of the Methodist church because of the constant pestering about money for building improvements.

We have expenses coming up, including a minister and a bunch of more work on the building. We hired an architectural firm at a cost of 5,000 dollars to tell us we need new siding and should tear down the stone walls. We had a contract offer from Diego Aguilar to do that for about 80,000 dollars, but the architects said it would cost about a quarter million and wanted tens of thousands more to professionally supervise the project. We are going to have to do it the old-fashioned way: take the list from the architects and use it to request proposals from various contractors, select between apples and oranges, and then supervise the fulfillment of the contract ourselves. We plan to take the advice of the architects and prioritize the south and west sides of the building, which should allow us to also retain a half time minister if we are frugal.

## Ministerial Search Team - Exciting News!!

At our March meeting, the board agreed with the search team's recommendation that Cindy Terlazzo be hired as our half time contract minister, for an 11-month term, with option for renewal, starting in August 2025. (continued...)

You'll remember that the board authorized a search team to put together an online application for a ½ time consulting minister in 2023. Our listing went live in May of 2023, but we had no applicants until the board authorized us to increase the salary and benefits last year. Besides Cindy, there were two other candidates who weren't really viable choices.



Cindy received her Master of Divinity from Lancaster Theological Seminary and entered into Preliminary Fellowship with the UUA in 2020. She is currently a quarter time minister at the UU Society of Gettysburg, in Gettysburg PA. Prior to becoming a minister she worked in the mental health field and was an active member of the various UU churches where she was a member. She recently moved, with her husband, to Rochester, in order to be closer to her children and grandchildren. She doesn't plan on relocating to the Watertown area, but is prepared to commute from Rochester and, when weather prevents this, to be available to us through electronic means. She will participate in board, and committee meetings over zoom, but will commute to Watertown to lead worship services and be in person as much as weather permits. She'll begin work officially in August with several trips to Watertown, to familiarize herself with us and our building, and meet with the board and as many others as wish to meet with her. She'll lead her first service in September, possibly at the Ingathering service. She's particularly interested in providing adult RE and has several ideas for interesting workshops, such as 'writing your own obituary,' or 'spiritual memoirs.'.

She comes with enthusiastic recommendations. The board chair of the UU Society of Gettysburg, where she's currently 1/4 time minister said: "I've been a UU for about 40 years and have had at least 18 ministers during that time. I would count about 4 of them as MY ministers. Ministers who really spoke to me. Cindy is one of them. . . . In all honesty, you can't go wrong with her. She's the real deal and we will miss her tremendously." She pointed out that their small church grew, and went from having no children to having 15 in their RE program while Cindy was their 1/4 time minister. And another person, who has known Cindy for 20 years said, "Cindy has what I would call Quiet Power. One of my favorite services of all time was by Cindy on Love. She is warm, caring but also fierce when it comes to social justice and making sure people feel seen and heard." Here's an update on our income. As of March 16, our fiscal year is 73% past. Our one pledge towards our electricity seems to be almost all received. Our money pledges for this year were \$35,497, and from pledgers we have received thus far \$27,962, or 79%. Of the 27 pledges for money, fourteen of us have already been able to bring in at least our original pledge. Separately, the cash put in the plates for our Generosity Project is thus far \$1900 (meaning at least \$475 for each of the other charities for which we voted last time). And \$69 brought in thus far for our

fair trade coffee. And \$2940 kindly given thus far from those families who didn't pledge this year. Thank you!

About a month ago, some architects whom we'd hired, found that the earlier plans were not all followed, and we have some weaknesses in our lovely building. Two kind checks totaling \$150 have been brought in already towards this building fund. One member has already figured out their pledge for the next fiscal year, and already brought in that check. Thanks to all for your financial participation. ~W. Allen, Humble Collector

## Heather's Kitchen

One of the best parts of the weather getting warmer is cooking on the grill. Here is one of our favorites: **Black bean burgers** 

### **Ingredients**

- 2 cans (14.5 ounces each) black beans
- 1 cup seasoned bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup grated white onion
- 1 whole egg
- hot sauce (optional)
- 1/2 tsp. chili powder
- salt and pepper (and any other spices you like)
- 8 slices of your favorite cheese
- · olive oil, for frying
- butter, for frying and grilling
- Whatever buns and / or toppings you like

### **Directions**

Drain, but do not rinse, the black beans. Place them in a bowl and use a fork to mash them. Keep mashing until they're mostly broken up, but still have some whole beans visible. Add the breadcrumbs, onion, egg, chili powder, salt, pepper, and hot sauce. Stir until everything is combined, then let the mixture sit for 5 minutes.

Heat a tablespoon or two of olive oil with an equal amount of butter in a skillet (or on a flat top grill) over medium-low heat. Form the bean mixture into patties slightly larger than the buns you're using (the patties will not shrink when they cook.) Place the patties in the skillet and cook them about 5 minutes on the first side. Flip them to the other side, place 2 slices of cheese onto each patty, and continue cooking them for another 5 minutes, or until the burgers are heated through. (Place a lid on the skillet to help the cheese melt if needed.)

Grill the buns on a griddle with a little butter until golden, add the patty, top with your condiments and toppings of choice, and enjoy!

This year we chose Citizens Advocates and Planned Parenthood. Each organization receives 1/4 of the uncommitted funds for the year.
